



We are grateful to those who


have donated to this project. The trails enhance the visitor experience and allow the preservation of native habitat in a key area of the North Platte River Valley.

Film about Grand Island Businessman, David Kaufman



Cowboy Artists of America Inductee Brandon Bailey

Brandon Bailey was the guest speaker at the August 7th Wild West Wednesday.



Growing up in Wyoming, it is only fitting that Brandon has an intense interest in Western culture. His fascination with rodeo and the Old West began during his childhood and continued throughout his life. From 2004 to 2006, he rode bulls competitively and rode for the Laramie County Community College rodeo team, as well as in the practice pen for fun. Rodeo has also found its way into Brandon's art. as he has been commissioned to create artwork for various Wyoming rodeo companies. Brandon is a member of the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians and added Native American art to his repertoire in 2019.

Late afternoon on August 5th the sounds of a National Guard helicopter disturbed the silence. It made a couple of passes around the rock and then hovered for a few minutes on the northeast side. They got a close up view of Chimney Rock.





Bart and Els from Bruges, Belgium stopped to see Chimney Rock on their way to Badlands, Black Hills, Yellowstone, and Salt Lake City.

This surprise visitor (left) showed up near the parking lot entrance on August 4th. He must have thought it was too hot for people. Usually, Big Horn Sheep do not come this close to the entrance.

There were extremely hot days during the last week of July and first part of August but visitors still stopped by and walked part of the trails. From August 1 to Aug 5, we welcomed almost 300 visitors from 27 states, including 21 counties in NE. There were also visitors from 3 countries.
