

# THE NEBRASKANS OF WORLD WAR II SCHOLARSHIP AND PEARL HARBOR REMEMBRANCE AWARD

## THE SCHOLARSHIPS

In 2025, the Nebraskans of World War II Scholarship Fund will award up to five (5) \$1,700 scholarships and up to two (2) \$750 Pearl Harbor Remembrance Awards to outstanding seniors from the communities listed below. The scholarship recipients will be announced no later than April 15, 2025.

Students must complete the application form and provide the supporting materials to the Scholarship committee no later than Friday, February 28, 2025. Application forms are available at the school counselor's office or, in the case of

the Lincoln Public Schools and Omaha Public Schools, via their scholarship portals. Applicants who do not receive the Nebraskans of World War II Scholarship will be considered for the Pearl Harbor Remembrance Award.

Family members, staff, and/or trustees of Nebraska State Historical Society Foundation and Nebraska State Historical Society are not eligible to receive scholarships.

Seniors applying must be from the school districts which encompass the hometowns of the memorialized sailors.

## THE NEBRASKANS OF WORLD WAR II SCHOLARSHIP

The Nebraskans of World War II Scholarship Fund was created to memorialize the brave men and women who served their country fighting for the freedoms of millions of people.

Two Lincoln, Nebraska, servicemen in particular, have been memorialized by their families through these scholarships: Edward J. Clough and Adrian B. DePutron.

GM1C Edward Clough was killed during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941 and remains entombed aboard the U.S.S. Arizona. His sister, Helen, chose to honor his memory through a gift that would help establish the Nebraskans of World War II Scholarship Fund.

Lt. Adrian DePutron was killed during the Battle of the Bulge on January 20, 1945, while serving with General Patton's Third Army. The Lieutenant's aunt, Marjorie Barstow, through her estate, honored her nephew's service with a gift to help enhance the scholarship program.

The Nebraskans of World War II Scholarship Fund provides up to five (5) \$1,700 scholarships to high school seniors from the school districts which encompass the communities that were hometowns of the entombed Nebraska sailors.

This scholarship is specifically designated for expenses and will be paid directly to the educational institution.

## THE PEARL HARBOR REMEMBRANCE AWARD

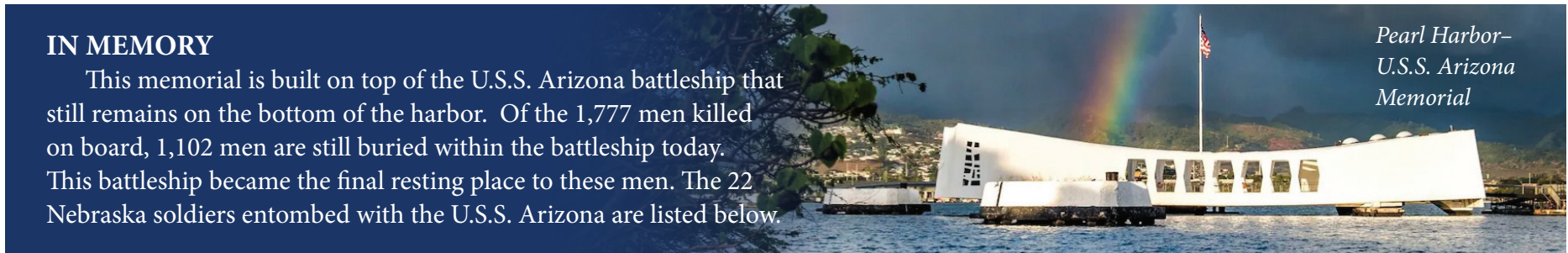
The Pearl Harbor Remembrance Award Fund was created by Colonel Barney Oldfield, a Tecumseh, Nebraska native, and his wife Vada to honor the 22 Nebraskans who were killed during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor and remain entombed in the U.S.S. Arizona.

*"Vada and I wanted to do something to honor those Nebraskans who lost their lives in Pearl*

*Harbor. We wanted to do more than lay a wreath or say a prayer. Those who lost their lives and those who knew them deserve more than dismissal as statistics and the anonymity given them by distance of both mileage and time. It was for that reason we established the Pearl Harbor Remembrance fund which links the names of those 22 men to awards for all of time to come."* — Colonel Oldfield

The Pearl Harbor Remembrance fund provides up to two (2) \$750 awards to high school seniors who applied for, but did not receive, the Nebraskans of World War II Scholarship.


The award may be used at the winner's discretion.

### IN MEMORY

This memorial is built on top of the U.S.S. Arizona battleship that still remains on the bottom of the harbor. Of the 1,777 men killed on board, 1,102 men are still buried within the battleship today. This battleship became the final resting place to these men. The 22 Nebraska soldiers entombed with the U.S.S. Arizona are listed below.
